



Rogation Shrines and Praying for Crops

This beautiful statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary and Baby Jesus came from the 1st log church that was built in 1856 or the 1866 Millside church. It is believed to come from this time period because there was horsehair found inside of it, which dates back to 18th or 19th century. The Rogation chapels were set at each corner of the town of St. Michael. These were used to pray for the crops. People would pray at each shrine. Each one facing east, west, north and south. There is one shrine that remains intact at the home of Bernard Hackenmueller. Every year, on a Sunday morning in the month of June, St. Michael's Church celebrated the Feast of Corpus Christi, an old-country custom. A procession of fifty to a hundred worshipers walked through the village, starting at the church. Leading the procession there was a group of young girls, all dressed in white, carrying baskets of peony flower petals which they scattered in the path of the procession.

Next came the servers in their cassocks and carrying lighted candles, then Father Micks in full vestments of the day, proceeding under a canopy carried by four men, one at each corner; the worshipers followed immediately behind. There were four or five small, permanent chapels adjacent to the sidewalks which were used only once a year, on this feast day. When the procession arrived at these buildings which had previously been opened and decorated with bouquets of flowers, with statues and a crucifix in place, Father Micks would give the people his blessing and benediction. One of the chapels was located close to Hackenmueller's house, one near Barthels' home, one near the Blakes, and one near Mrs. Miller-Barble's house. The chapels have long since been removed and disposed of

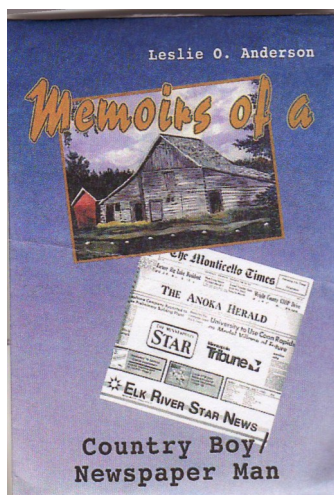


“Village at Dusk”

Local Author Leslie O. Anderson Message about Writing Our Stories



At a St. Michael Historical Society meeting on March 5, 2007 Leslie Anderson will tell why he wrote his book and why he thinks it is important for all of us to write our life stories down, not just for our families, but for future generations. Anderson was born in 1928 on a farm near Princeton, Minn. The Great Depression and the drought of the 1930's was in full swing during his youth. He tells of the hardships and the good times of the era. The farm on which Mr. Anderson grew up provided all the vegetables, fruits, meat and dairy products to feed the family of five.

He and his wife Elaine have lived in Elk River for 38 years. He has published two other books, "The Homestead" and "My Life With Polio." Several other stories have been written and are awaiting publishing. Anderson has been in the newspaper business for 59 years with the first newspaper being the "Monticello Times." The first Crow River wooden bridge was built in the late 1800s by horse drawn wagons and equipment. The second iron bridge was built in 1932 by hand labor. The workers paid 25 cents an hour. The new one was built in the Fall of 2006.

The Berning Brothers, Joseph and Bernard [Ben] built a dam and a mill on the Crow River, near the old bridge and the Millside Tavern. The dam was installed to provide water power for Bernings' Mill, where they ground grain into feed for the farmers, and milled flour which they sold to the stores in the neighboring towns. They also had a sawmill for sawing lumber from logs bought by the farmers. It was operated by water power from the flume in the dam. A flume is an inclined channel for conveying water for power.

The original flour mill built in 1881 was three stories and torn down in 1942. It was leaning and unsafe. Later the second mill was used strictly for grinding feed for cattle—mostly corn. The second mill closed in 1998. Anthony Berning, the father of Joseph and Ben was one of the early settlers of this area. He was appointed as the first postmaster in 1858 when there was a regular stage line that ran from Dayton to St. Michael, which was originally called Frankfort. Ben's sons, Leon and Everett worked the mill and sawmill next to it. There was also a thriving ice business on the river that provided ice for St. Michael, Albertville and Dayton. The last ice was harvested in 1945. Everett married Loretta Hofmann in 1940 and they had two sons, John and Ralph.

Historical Society News

The first meeting was April 11, 2005. We had a booth at Heritage Day and Fall Festival September 2005 and 2006. Tours of the Historic Church and a video of the 1990 Centennial celebration were shown. New members joined and photos were shared. Bob Zahler presented slide presentations of St. Michael in 1900 and 1954 for several group discussions. We have received several photos of Home Talent Plays and Actors Play Books. On February 6th, 2006 we began collecting photos of farms. The Society has accomplished much in the first two years. Our Village at Dusk fundraiser in November of 2006 proved to be very successful. We would like to thank the St. Michael American Legion for a very generous donation in January 2007 and the St. Michael Lion's Club for their donation in February 2007.
