Historic Round Barn A St. Michael Landmark

It's sad to see that all across the rural parts of Minnesota, slices of farm history and architecture are rapidly disappearing. Old barns are nostalgic icons. They are the common man's architecture and reminders of a rural economy that formed the backbone of this nation. They are also reminders of a different lifestyle that many of us would like to get back to. A slower and more independent way of life when families had more control of their own destiny.

Many old barns are functionally obsolete. Some have collapsed in disrepair or have been damaged by lightning and storms. Others have been razed because of all the new housing developments being built on former farmland.

Concerned historic preservationists want to keep some of these in tact. They warn there won't be any around in twenty years. Eventually they will all fall down, be burned or torn down.

We never seem to notice these kind of things until it's too late.

A study made by the Minnesota Historical Society estimated that the number of historic barns in Minnesota have dramatically declined by 75 per cent since 1930, roughly about 2 per cent or 1000 per year. Don't we need at least some fields of wheat, corn, and farm buildings to rest our eyes upon as we drive to work, shop and visit other parts of town. Minnesota's first grass roots barn preservation group called Friends of Minnesota Barns was formed in 2004. They're helping folks from all over Minnesota save their barns.

Lenneman Round Barn

This St. Michael landmark is one of the few historic round barns left in Minnesota. There is something beautiful and enduring about the unique structure. More than 2 dozen millioned windows dot its 64 foot diameter, and carefully nailed boards encircle the soaring 60 foot tall domed roof.

A book of the history of Wright county claimed it was the most completely equipped and handsomest barn of its kind in the whole county.

George Meyer and Louie Klatt built the barn and the house in 1906. No one really knew the intention of the builders and why they built a round barn. But relatives say that Meyer was a perfectionist.

The farm was sold to Nick and Theresa Lenneman in 1914 and later to Henry Lenneman in 1917. His sons, Richard and Ronald purchased the farm from their dad.

The barn once sheltered cows and pigs in the bottom and the hayloft and straw was kept on the top floor. The milkhouse was attached to the barn. A bad wind storm hit the barn and took off the two big doors going into the haybarn in the 1990s.

The owners, Richard, Margery, Ronald and Delrose Lenneman have moved and the surrounding fields

have been sold to developers.

The barn has since been purchased by a couple who plan to make it into a

coffee shop and antique store in the Kimbal area. They hired a moving company that will take it a part and move it at night.

To visit this historical barn take #19 North to #34 West to Jaber Avenue North about 3-4 blocks Located on Jamison Avenue.
