Family Tree Researcher Presentation--Stephen S. Barthel



Stephen Barthel was accredited in German research in 1981. His insatiable interest in genealogy led to a career of twenty-one years, working for the largest genealogical repository in the world, the Family History Library in Salt Lake City. He worked as a reference consultant for Central European, Eastern European and International research. For five of those years it was his privilege to work in the VIP Unit of the Family History Library, not only hosting VIPs, but doing research for such notables as the Queen of Sweden, presidents of the United States and Germany, several U.S. senators and governors, nationally known television news anchors, and many other high profile individuals.

Stephen Barthel is a former resident of St. Michael and gave a slide presentation and a talk about the St. Michael founding families and their German origins. He told of how to get started researching your own family trees; starting with what you do know and adding more from the internet and other sources. It was a great turnout and we hope he comes back again.

According to Stephen, "Genealogical research or tracing family trees is fun! It is similar to hiking up a hill to see what's on the other side, and then you keep going to see what lies further ahead. It is like being a detective, gathering and examining evidence found in records. Records provide clues, leading you on a paper trail that can span several centuries of record keeping. Perhaps 'the frosting on the cake' for me is to travel to these ancestral villages and rub shoulders with my German and Polish relatives, who settled in the St. Michael and Delano areas. It is more rewarding than visiting castles and other tourist traps, because you immerse yourself into the lives of the people and their culture."

Stephen has just completed an ancestry book on the Frank Theodore Aydt and Mary Anne Igel family. Frank Aydt was among the early settlers of St. Michael, leaving Europe through Le Havre, France at the age of 12, arriving in New Orleans on Jan. 30, 1852 with his mother, Theresia and three of his siblings, Agatha, Carolina and Thekla.

Frank was from Ersingen, Baden, Germany and married Mary Anne Igel in St. Paul, Minnesota. Mary Anne was from Herbertingen in Württemberg, Germany. They eventually settled in Frankfort Township, which is now St. Michael. He has traced their lines back to the 1600s.

According to Stephen, many of the original 14 families of the people from St. Michael came from two villages in Baden, Germany, which are located in the southwestern part of the country— Bilfingen and Ersingen. This area is now called Kämpfelbach. Many of the founding families lived close to one another in Germany, came over to America together and then settled in St. Michael. Later they communicated with others who wanted to settle in a place where they knew people and of course could speak the language.

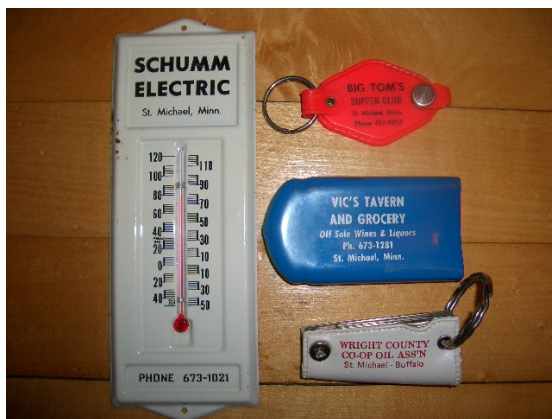
